

Melvin Carter Jr. is a true son of St. Paul, as was his father and hero, Melvin Carter Sr. Melvin grew up in the Rondo neighborhood in the 1950s and '60s. He experienced firsthand the decimation of the radiant, vibrant Rondo community for the construction of Interstate 94.

As a student, Melvin struggled in the classroom and also on the streets. As a young man, he enlisted in the US Navy and was stationed in Morocco where he used his skill inside the boxing ring to win matches and earn self-respect. After his return home, he joined the St. Paul Police Department as an affirmative action hire where he continued to fight crime and battle racism on the streets and within the Department.

Still, his stories and perspective on life is joy-filled and passionate. From his father's example, he became a steady and constant presence in the community, in the city that spawned and nurtured him. From his mother he inherited a spirit that doesn't back down or walk away from the fight to seek justice.

In these days of local, national and international strife, as we find ourselves again saturated with racism's social toxin, spending time learning and laughing from this son of St. Paul is a tonic at the end of a long evening.

An emotionally charged recounting of the turmoil in Albert Lea during the 1959 Wilson's meatpacking strike as seen through the eyes of a teenager.

Eva Barr adapts Cheri Register's 2001 memoir about coming of age in Albert Lea, MN during the 1959 Wilson's meatpacking plant strike. The play spans the inciting moments of the strike to the violence and divisiveness that resulted, but it is Register's personal awakening to the meaning of class in her life as the daughter of a blue-collar worker that provides the universal hook.

In November, 1959, a worker on the sausage line at the Wilson plant in Albert Lea, MN, refused to stay and work overtime. His move catalyzed events that would lead to a national strike and to rifts between people in Albert Lea that still exist today. The script includes contemporary teenage inquiry to explore some of the social and economic divides that continue to confound rural America. As Register's grandfather might have put it, class is one of those "disquieting" subjects that applies to us all.

Barr says, "I chose to adapt *Packinghouse Daughter* for the stage for a number of reasons: because Cheri Register's voice is so clear and compelling that it's a treat to work with her words; because she grew up in my hometown where incredible things happen every day; because it documents a sadly bygone era in Albert Lea's history; because some people won't pick up a book, but they might sit in an audience; because the subject-matter, meatpacking and growing up, will be relevant as long as we eat meat and grow up; because the book takes on essential questions of being 'American,' of being human, and takes us to places we might not go on our own."



How do you define a legacy?

In 1938, Harold Stassen was dubbed Boy Wonder and the future of the Republic party after being elected the Governor of Minnesota at age 31. By 1992, Stassen's political career ended as a perennial candidate who sought, and lost, his bid for the Republican presidential nomination a record nine-times.

What came in-between is the story of a war hero who helped create the United Nations and served as a key player in the Eisenhower administration. But also the story of a man who routinely fought to redefine a party that was not ready for change, defying those he needed most to make it to the White House. From writer/composer Keith Hovis comes a new musical that explores the life of a man who was supposed to be President. Until he wasn't.

This new musical explores the ever-changing roles of women over the last century through the lens of Betty Crocker, America's First Lady of Food. "Born" in 1921 to the company that would become General Mills, Betty was a marketing invention—not a real person—but she came to represent far more than just flour. In 1945, Fortune Magazine named Betty Crocker the 2nd most popular woman in America. Originally depicted as white, blue-eyed, and middle-aged, Betty morphed over time as society grappled with questions of race and gender. At once a radio personality, a letter-writing confidante, a cheerleader and a scold, Betty taught a nation how to "add an egg" and much, much more.
