LIFE: A Smorgasbord of Topics and Experts

As a recent member of the LIFE Board, let me briefly introduce myself before reviewing my take on the LIFE program. My story is just one example of the wide range of backgrounds of members of the LIFE community. This ensures that we hear different points of view and shared experiences in class discussions and associated social interactions.

My wife and two toddler boys came to the Mayo Clinic in 1968 to take part in a Federally funded research program to evaluate the impact of orbital rocket launch on blood supply to the lung. This project was at Mayo Clinic because it had a human centrifuge which could mimic the "G" forces experienced in a rocket launched to orbit. Subsequently my job morphed into development of imaging techniques used to better measure physiological processes in the cardiovascular system.

As you might imagine, when I retired a few years ago I suddenly lost the companionship of my work-colleagues and the stimulus of tomorrow's tasks and promises. The distraction of the usual post retirement travel to distant family, friends and exotic places was fine, but my curiosity needed more feeding and the LIFE program was a good match.

My take on joining the LIFE community, like many of its members who are also in similar situations, is that the program provides topics on the wide spectrum of past, present and possibly future interesting events, scientific developments and diverse cultural aspects. Expert presentations on that range of topics and the companionship resulting from discussions of the various topics as well as the personal interactions at get-together functions go a fair way in filling the contact void.

I hope to illustrate some of those LIFE's activities by the following topics of presentations over the coming months. The presentation calendar of April through June 2022 LIFE classes again covers topics ranging from US history (eg Lewis and Clark), treasured structures (eg Hoover Dam), arts (eg treasures in Art musea), war-related issues (eg Vietnam war), foreign issues (eg post WW2 Germany) and many other thought provoking (and memory resurrecting) issues. This smorgasbord of topics and associated expert presenters from all states, a variety of institutions and personal experiences was assembled by Chrisanne Pieper and facilitated by Jamie Schroeder of the LIFE office, for which we are all grateful. Finally, in the spirit of the perceived tapering off of the Covid-19 pandemic's incidence to manageable levels we are excited to see that a selected number of classes will return to in-person presentations at the Heintz Center again, although most remain via the very successful Zoom method.
