

### <u> Rapa Nui – Easter Island with Steve Troutman</u>

Rapa Nui, also known as Easter Island or Isla de Pascua, located in the Southeastern Pacific Ocean, is one of the most remote islands on earth. It is known for its enigmatic statues of elongated stone heads standing up to 33 feet tall, called Moai. We went to Rapa Nui in February of 2012, and have pictures to share, but this presentation will also cover the fascinating environment and ecology, and the rich, but tragic, history of Rapa Nui. We will journey through time from the arrival of the first Polynesians in the 1100s to modern times as part of Chile.

Jennifer Baughn is a native of Milton, Florida but has lived in Jackson for 25 years. She attended Northland Baptist Bible College and later received her master's degree in history from Florida State University. As an architectural historian with the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Jennifer has surveyed over 800 historic Mississippi schools, conducted building-by-building damage assessments in fourteen historic districts on the Coast after Hurricane Katrina, and more recently has documented scores of antebellum outbuildings in and around Natchez. In addition to publishing several scholarly articles about school architecture and segregation, she also authored

the National Historic Landmark nomination for the Medgar and Myrlie Evers House in Jackson. Her book, with co-author Michael Fazio, Buildings of Mississippi, was published in 2021. As Chief Architectural Historian, she oversees the National Register of Historic Places and the Survey and Inventory programs and serves on the Review Committee for the Mississippi Landmark program.

<u>Separate but Equal? African American Schools in Mississippi, 1920-1960 with Jennifer Baughn, Chief</u> <u>Architectural Historian, Mississippi Department of Archives and History</u>

Mississippi's African American school buildings still occupy the center of their communities, recalling the struggles of segregation but also the attempts to overcome it. African American efforts to gain parity with white schools in the 1920s with assistance from the Julius Rosenwald Fund gave way to stagnation during the Depression, when many consolidated white schools were built with federal grants. By the 1950s, threats of desegregation from the Civil Rights movement forced the Mississippi Legislature to fund a massive "Equalization Program" that built sprawling consolidated campuses in every county in the state in an effort to create a segregated system that was truly "separate but equal."

**Taylor Hagood PhD** teaches American literature, with specialization in the writing of William Faulkner, African American literature, and the literature and culture of the United States South. His scholarship examines literary and cultural production in an approach informed by postcolonial theory, theorizing of social interaction via secrecy as a cultural item, and disability studies. Hagood's books include Faulkner's Imperialism: Space, Place, and the Materiality of Myth (2008); Secrecy, Magic, and the One-Act Plays of Harlem Renaissance Women Writers (2010); and Faulkner:

Writer of Disability (2014), winner of the C. Hugh Holman Award for Best Book in Southern Literary Studies. Hemingway with Taylor Hagood PhD, Professor of American Literature, Florida Atlantic University Few writers have had the charisma of Ernest Hemingway. As a young man he developed an exacting writing style that blended simplicity and profundity. He moved from experiences of being wounded in World War I to ensconcing himself in Left Bank Paris to settling into a life of fishing and drinking rum in Key West to hunting in African and Idaho to winning the Nobel Prize in Literature. Along the way, he became an iconic legend in his own time referred to simply as "Papa." This lecture tells his fascinating story and presents his writing, which remains impactful (and even explores Hemingway's connections with Rochester, Minnesota!).

**Dr. Jodi Skipper** is an applied anthropologist at the University of Mississippi, who explores the representation of African American lives through material culture. Her theoretical approach draws on contextual emphases in public history, public archaeology, and cultural representations in museum studies. Dr. Skipper established a foundation for intersecting these fields through her dissertation work on the St. Paul United Methodist Church, an historically African American church in the Dallas, Texas arts district. She examined the church community's prospects of preserving its historic building and historical legacy through two heritage projects; one in which

archaeologists excavated a shotgun house site on the church property and a public history project in which she created an interpretive history exhibition on the church. During her time at the University of Mississippi, Dr. Skipper extended her focus by investigating how African American historic sites interact with the production of heritage in tourism spaces through two new projects, the Behind the Big House program in Marshall County, Mississippi and the Promiseland Historic Preservation project in St. Martin Parish, Louisiana. She explores how African American pasts are represented in the present.

### <u>Behind the Big House: Representing Slavery in Mississippi with Jodi Skipper PhD, Department of</u> <u>Anthropology and Southern Studies, University of Mississippi</u>

Behind the Big House is one of few historic site tours developed with the specific goal of interpreting slavery. The program began with several private homeowners in Holly Springs, Mississippi, who opened slave houses on their properties to the public. Since 2012, the program has educated thousands in North Mississippi and Arkansas. This presentation discusses the development of the program, what it tells us about slavery in North Mississippi, and the necessity of telling these stories today. Jodi recently published the book, "Behind the Big House, Reconciling Slavery, Race, and Heritage in the U.S. South."

**Richard Kowles PhD** is Distinguished Professor Emeritus in Biology at Saint Mary's University of Minnesota in Winona, MN. His undergraduate degree was obtained from Winona State University and after completing two masters degrees, one in biology and one in education, he earned a Ph.D. in genetics at the University of Minnesota. He has taught for 58 years at various levels, the last 40 years as a geneticist and cell biologist at Saint Mary's University. Kowles is the author of two college textbooks, Genetics, Society, and Decisions and Problem Solving in Genetics, and more recently a trade

book, "The Wonder of Genetics." His latest book was "A Passion to Teach. Fifty-eight Years of Humorous, Weird, and Engaging Tales."

### Another Genetic Revelation: CRISPR and Gene Editing with Richard Kowles PhD, Saint Marys University Emeritus

A power point presentation will be a discussion of overall gene editing. The beginning will be a review of the procedures already available. The focus will be on the present use of restriction enzymes to cut the DNA and then insert DNA from another source into that site, even from one species to another. Such gene therapy, however, has its drawbacks because gene insertion does not always occur in a precise manner. More recently, a technique called CRISPR has come to the forefront of such research, described as another genetic breakthrough. How CRISPR works and eliminates the problems of other methods will be carefully explained. Lastly, gene editing with CRISPR and it use for actual gene therapy will be outlined. An emphasis will be made regarding the pros and cons of its use in human subjects.

Beyond the Birdfeeder with John Toren

In this class we'll explore various tricks to help you see and identify birds in the field (and also at the bird-feeder). Topics to be covered will include how to use binoculars; where, when, and with whom to go birding; and what specific elements come into play when trying to figure out what bird you're looking at. These elements include location (e.g.

field, marsh, woods), time of year, general type (e.g. duck-like, heron-like, woodpecker-like), size, posture, song, beak shape and size, and distinctive markings (e.g. wing-bars, eye-ring, tail length). We will go on to put this knowledge to work examining image-sheets of a few challenging bird groups, including sparrows, thrushes, and warblers. Birding can be a life-long challenge, but it becomes easier once you know what to look and listen for.

His writing on destinations on six continents has twice been awarded gold medals for excellence by the Society of American Travel Writers and includes over 250 magazine articles and 10 books such as Treasures of Alaska: Last Great American Wilderness published by National Geographic Books and Jewels on the Water: Lake Superior's Apostle Islands. His photography,

known for its creative artistry, has been featured in publications such as Reader's Digest, National Geographic Traveler, and Backpacker. Currently, he lives in Bayfield where he and his wife act as the Co-Directors of Friends of the Apostle Islands helping the National Park Service protect our beautiful wild places.

## Lighthouse Keepers, Hermits, and Pirates: Stories of the Apostle Islands with Jeff Rennicke, Author, Photographer

Is there really buried treasure in the Apostle Islands hidden by a hermit who died without telling a soul? Did pirates really ply the waters of the Apostles plundering unsuspecting ships? How did Anna Carlson earn the nickname the "Heroine of Michigan Island"? From shipwrecks to solitude, this entertaining class with storyteller Jeff Rennicke will explore the many stories (some of them even true) that have been, and are still being, told about the Apostle Islands.

Dr. Grivno's first book, Gleanings of Freedom: Free Labor and Slavery along the Mason-Dixon Line, 1790-1860, was published in 2011 as part of the University of Illinois Press's series The Working Class in American History. Grivno is currently writing From Bondage to Freedom: Slavery in Mississippi, 1690-1865. Dr. Grivno's teaching interests include the Old South, slavery, labor history and Mississippi history. Max was born in Crookston, MN and educated at St. Olaf in Northfield.

### <u>Slavery in Antebellum Mississippi with Max Grivno PhD, Department of History, University of Southern</u> <u>Mississippi</u>

By 1860, Mississippi's farms and plantations yielded 1.2 million bales of cotton, making it the nation's leading cotton producer. This prosperity rested on the backs of some 436,631 enslaved blacks, who constituted 55 percent of the state's population and who made Mississippi the third-largest slave-holding state, behind only Virginia and Georgia. This presentation examines the development of slavery from the perspective of the enslaved. Beginning with the "Flush Times" of the 1830s and continuing to the outbreak of the Civil War, it examines the interstate slave trade, the working lives of enslaved blacks and the myriad ways in which bondsmen and women struggled against their masters. It traces the paths of runaway slaves, reconstructs slave uprisings and insurrection scares, looks at their families and communities and follows the enslaved into the state's churches. The presentation draws from auto-biographies and interviews with former slaves, newspapers, plantation records and government documents.

### Natural Selection and Speciation Leading to Evolution with Richard Kowles PhD, Saint Marys University Emeritus

Natural selection is one of the forces that leads to evolution; that is, the development of new species from pre-existing types of organisms. A power point discussion will include a detailed explanation of natural selection as proposed by Charles Darwin in 1859, along with some examples of the process. In addition, attention will be given to different isolating mechanisms that eventually result in new species. Processes other than

natural selection that result in speciation will also be discussed. Evidence for the occurrence of evolution will be outlined. In order to understand the scientific view of evolution, it will be necessary to carefully explain the difference among the meaning of hypothesis, theory, and fact.
